WORSHIP AND FORMATION

<u>The Nursery & Toddler Room</u> is located on the first floor off the main hallway and is open from 9:50 a.m.—12:15 p.m. for ages 4 months to 3 years old. Parents may gather their children for Communion and then return them during formation hour.

Godly Play at 10:00 a.m. is for children ages 3 (by October 15) to kindergarten and is located in the first floor hallway past the restrooms. Children can be dropped off between 9:50 a.m.—10:00 a.m. Children will be brought back into the sanctuary in time for Communion. Teachers will assist them in finding their family if necessary.

<u>Trinity Kids Worship</u> at 10:00 a.m. is for children grades 1 through 5 and is located in the upstairs hallway past the restrooms in the TKW room. Children sit with their family before the service and follow the second cross of the procession out of the sanctuary and upstairs. Children will return to the sanctuary at the Peace.

<u>Trinity Kids Grow</u> at 10:00 a.m. is for middle school students grades 5 through 7 and is located immediately upstairs beside the staircase in the TKG room. Students sit with their family before the service and follow the second cross of the procession out of the sanctuary and upstairs. Students will return to the sanctuary at the Peace.

<u>Episcopal Youth Community</u> is Trinity's youth group that serves teens in grades 7 through 12 and meets Sunday evenings from 6:00 p.m.—8:00 p.m. in the youth room located in the basement level of the church.

SUNDAY SERVICES DURING LENT

Lent is a time for self-examination and reflection. The Sunday service, while still celebrating the Resurrection, changes to a more solemn rite.

The Great Litany, sung in procession at the beginning of the first Sunday in Lent, takes the place of the Prayers of the People and the Confession. On the subsequent Sundays in Lent, a silent procession follows the opening voluntary. The first hymn is then sung standing in place.

The closing hymn is sung in place, and then a silent procession of the acolytes and clergy ends the service. These times in the service are designed for additional self-reflection and to draw us into our Lenten Journey to the Cross.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Both today's organ prelude and anthem were composed by Johannes Brahms (1833-1897). Two weeks ago we heard his chorale prelude on "O God, Thou Faithful God." Today we hear the last of the eleven chorale preludes, "O World, I Now Must Leave Thee." The autograph manuscript of this prelude is dated July 1896 and is the last composition which Brahms wrote. He uses a double echo in the setting of this chorale.

Today's anthem, *Schaffe in mir, ein rein Herz*, Op. 29, No. 2 (Create in Me, O God, a Pure Heart) is the first of three parts based on Psalm 51 (today's psalm). This work is much earlier than the organ works and was composed when Brahms was in his midtwenties. At age twenty Brahms had become friends with Robert and Clara Schumann, who introduced him to the works of J. S. Bach. The influence of Bach is heard in the canon in today's anthem between the soprano and second bass parts. The second part of the motet, not heard today, is a fugue. Written about the same time as this motet is his most famous chorale work, *A German Requiem*, which the May Festival Chorus and Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra recently performed.



The Sermon The Rev. Peter D. D'Angio

The Nicene Creed (stand)
